Item 7. Methods of implementation			
7.1	It has been necessary to revise our approach to disclosure and assurance in the light of experience. The IS presented a summary of how they are being implemented in practice. Importantly the 'Baseline Study' has been renamed a 'Scoping Study' and no longer gathers data on completed projects. Its focus is now on gathering the data needed to effectively plan the new national programme. With regard to disclosure, the responsibility sits with procuring entities from the outset. The Board was content with the revisions and how they are being implemented.	N/A	N/A

8.1	Funds are not available for scaling-up CoST in line with our Business Plan. And in terms of DGF funding, \$50k needs to be allocated to the independent evaluation in the current financial year. If, as we anticipate, the Dutch Government finalises its commitment, it will help to ease the pressure, at least in the short term. Given these constraints, the Board identified the following activities to be considered if funding allows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • An African Champions' meeting • Other regional Champions' meetings • Regional events in East/Central Asia • North American industry stakeholders event • A media campaign to promote the results of disclosure.
